		Development Agency has been supporting the promotion and implementation of high quality and sustainable primary health care for Nigerians through resource mobilization, partnerships, collaboration, functional infrastructure and development of community-based systems.
		But it has become clear that long standing, stubborn issues in primary health care will require new ways of problem solving, especially with the coming of COVID-19.

The program aimed to develop and deepen key HCD competencies, such as participatory cocreation and empathic research, and HCD mindsets such as empathy, creativity, openmindedness, simplicity and action orientation .

During Design Clinics the session participants were guided through the four stages of HCD— Discover, Define, Create, and Test—in order to learn by doing to develop their own innovative solutions to implement and scale. HCD Basics is a self-directed e-learning course that helps individuals to learn the core principles of HCD and its application to primary health care

It is worth noting that A new model for building competency in HCD among public health actors has been developed and tested. Two state government teams and CHAI have reached intermediate level competency in applying HCD Two innovative solutions to improve primary health care were tested and are ready for implementation Over 150 key decision makers from government, NGOs, private sector and donor agencies were introduced to HCD An e-learning course is available for actors in primary health care to continue learning about applying HCD.
